Yellow App renamed Yubo



Yellow is an app that has that has been dubbed by some as a 'Tinder for Teens.' This app has now been reamed as Yubo and has many new features such as live streaming, group video chat and instant messaging.

When creating a profile, users can only upload real photographs rather than an avatar. There is a safety guide for teens and parents on the Yubo website. As with all social networking sites it is important to remember how easy it is to create a fake profile page and exploit other users.

Parents need to have an awareness of the apps children are using, be aware of potential risks and have regular conversations to help them make positive choices online.

It is a game growing in popularity amongst children and involves 100 players fighting each other in real time to be the final survivor. To survive players collect weapons and armory and build structures to defend or hide in, while battling everyone else in the game. It is really important to note that **Epic Games: Fortnite Battle Royale says it does not direct the game to children under the age of 13 in the UK.** As with other multiplayer games, there have been online safety concerns raised regarding Fortnite including: chat via text or voice, violent imagery, in-app purchases and possible game addiction. Help keep your child safe online when playing online games:

- Talk to your child regularly about what they are doing online and how to stay safe. Let them know they can come to you or another trusted adult if they're feeling worried or upset by anything they have seen
- Use digital devices together: Get involved in your child's online activities. Have fun, play games, and learn together online
- **Set clear expectations:** Agree your own rules as a family when using sites, apps and games
- Set time limits: Games can be addictive
- **Be informed:** Set appropriate parental controls

Age Ratings

We have many children from reception to Year 6 who talk to us in depth about playing this game. Therefore, we thought it would be useful to share the recommended age ratings for the game.

- Epic Games: Fortnite Battle Royale says it does not direct the game to children under the age of 13 in the UK.
- The PEGI rating for this game is 12 years old. However, PEGI does not take chat features into consideration when rating games. You can find out more about age ratings here.

The App Store says that users must be 12+ to play

Age ratings are there for a reason. <u>Please consider these carefully.</u>
